### Tuesday, June 21, 2016

- **9 a.m. – 11:45 a.m. – Emergency Responder Health Monitoring and Surveillance**

The Emergency Responder Health Monitoring and Surveillance (ERHMS) system is intended to keep responders, volunteers, and contractors safe during all phases of emergency response (pre-, during, and post-deployment). Participants of this training will learn how to begin to implement measures that will better protect valuable human assets who are critical to maintaining response capabilities across the organizations that called upon to safeguard the larger community during and after a large scale incident.

- **12:30 p.m. – 3:15 p.m. – Foodborne Illness Outbreak Investigation**

This presentation will explain the different roles and responsibilities in a foodborne illness outbreak, from the initial complaint to the findings and everything in between. IDPH's roles in Food, Drugs and Dairies, Communicable Disease and Laboratory will be clarified, as well as the role of the local health department. This presentation will also provide an overview of how the local health department can prepare for and conduct a foodborne illness investigation/ environmental assessment and how that differs from a routine regulatory inspection.

- **3:30 p.m. – 4:45 p.m. – Pediatric Evacuation: You Don't Get to Go Home but You Can't Stay Here**

The size and mobility of pediatric patients can present unique challenges when they must be evacuated from the hospital. This session provides an overview of situations when hospitalized pediatric patients may need to be evacuated, explains the role of hospital staff in evacuating pediatric patients, reviews various methods and routes for evacuating, and discusses special considerations when evacuating children. Pediatric appropriate evacuation equipment is also highlighted.

- **12:30 p.m. – 1:45 p.m. – Understanding Continuity of Operations Planning (COOP) for Healthcare**

This workshop will provide an overview of Continuity of Operations Planning (COOP), Business Continuity Planning (BCP), Emergency Operations Planning (EOP), and Disaster Recovery (DR) for the healthcare industry. The agenda will focus on plan development, maintenance, and compliance. Specific items for discussion will include the pending CMS legislation for COOP, CDC, and ASPR emergency planning guidance, and planning realities for large and small organizations. This workshop has been designed for the general audience with applicability for senior executive management, emergency management professionals, and medical and administrative staff for primary operations.

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### Wednesday, June 22, 2016 *continued*

- **2:15 p.m. – 3:30 p.m. – Rural Hospital Emergency Preparedness and Response**  
Rural hospitals face many challenges regarding emergency management, preparedness, and response. Some of these challenges include resource limitations, remoteness, separation, low population, special population, and communication issues. By identifying these issues early, organizations can be much more prepared. This presentation will enhance current knowledge and response by identifying interoperable avenues to assist in response.
- **3:45 p.m. – 5 p.m. – Legionnaires' Outbreak at the Illinois Veterans Home – Adams County: Coordination, Collaboration and Communication**  
This panel will give participants an overview of a large-scale outbreak response that resulted in 53 confirmed cases of legionellosis that included 12 deaths among residents of a long-term care facility in the fall of 2015. Presenters will share the challenges and lessons learned, along with tools and strategies to navigate the intense information demand from the media, community partners and residents during a quickly evolving disease outbreak. This interactive session will give participants the opportunity to ask questions and learn best practices to enhance resiliency and response in future disease outbreaks and disaster response.

### Thursday, June 23, 2016

- **9 a.m. – 10:15 a.m. – Boots on the Ground and Birds in the Sky**  
When a disaster strikes, it is imperative to have situation awareness, a flow of reliable information, and an ability to give specific orders to your first responders and volunteers in the field. By using smart phones, the Incident Command Center (ICC) can track first responders' movements, assign them to tasks, and create search/buffer zones without leaving the ICC or without the responder leaving the field. Moreover, drones serve as an early warning device, scout, and allow the Incident Commander to have a bird's eye view of the situation.
